

Young woman breaks two-hundred-year-old tradition

Tuscaloosa, Ala. First Lieutenant Kayla Freeman, 26, Alabama National Guard, became the first African- American- woman helicopter pilot in the 200 years history of the Alabama National Guard.

After receiving her wings in 2018, Freeman was deployed to Camp Taji, Iraq with her unit in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. She flew over 250 combat flight hours accident free and incident free.

In May 2019, Freeman was awarded the Air Medal. "I didn't think about making history when I started this journey. I just wanted to do the best that I could do and hopefully inspire a few people along the way," Freeman said

Maj. Gen. Sheryl Gordon applauded Freeman's historic accomplishment. Gordon is the first female general officer in the Alabama National Guard and is now the first female to serve as its adjutant general. "We take the ideals of equal opportunity very seriously," Gordon said, "and we're extremely proud of lieutenant Freeman's achievements. She is further proof that we don't see race or gender in the Alabama. National Guard -- we see Soldiers and Airmen and

their potential. She has worked very hard to earn those wings, and that's a great example for all of us."


"Freeman is a perfect example of the quality of soldiers we have in our military." Nicolas Britto, president, AUSA West/Central Alabama Chapter said.

Freeman attended Tuskegee University, where she received a B.S. in Aerospace Science Engineering. At her civilian job she is a Flight Test Engineer for the U.S. Army Redstone Center in Huntsville, Alabama.

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Chaplain's Corner

Dealing with Personal Loss

I hope you don't mind me sharing a personal experience about a loss in my life and how God helped me to cope and recover. I hope this is helpful to you in some way.

It was a Saturday morning in April twenty-seven years ago, I was supposed to be at Limestone Prison to share the Gospel with inmates. As I prepared to leave home, I received a clear and ominous warning from the Lord, don't go. I could tell it was a message from the Lord and I remember I said, Yes Sir, I won't go. Two hours passed. I started to rationalize that maybe I misunderstood, and I should go ahead to the prison. As I planned to leave, I told my wife that I was going ahead, and as I headed to the door that same warning came back, don't go. This time as an old soldier I knew I had better obey, so I made up my mind to stay home, wondering why I was not supposed to go.

At about 2:00 p.m. a neighbor called who I had been counselling and praying with by phone that week desperately saying that he and his wife, who was a registered nurse, just had to come over to pray with us about their family problem! I told him my wife was not there, but as I said this the door opened as she returned from town. Ten minutes later we greeted them and welcomed them into our living room. My wife of 31 years who had endured the family separations and hardships that go with an Army career, opened her Bible and started to read a scripture that she thought the Lord had for them from Philippians, Chapter 4: 4-9,

"Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God, and the peace of God which transcends all understanding will guard your hearts

and your minds in Christ Jesus".

I will never forget, as she read this scripture how she was suddenly struck with a heart attack and was gone! No matter how we tried, we could not bring her back. An hour and a half later after that ride in the ambulance to the hospital I was back home, a stunned widower.

The shock and emptiness were overwhelming, but it became clear that this beautiful scripture was meant for me as I experienced the "peace that passes all understanding" and the healing that only He could give. In time He blessed me with another beautiful lady.

In my life there were times that I left the Lord, but as His Word says, "I will never leave you, nor forsake you," He never has, and I'll never forsake him again. As I grow older, I know without any doubt that the best is yet to come!



He currently serves on the Board of Directors for The Schools Foundation and the Association of the United States Army – Redstone Chapter. He is a member of the Downtown Huntsville Chapter of the Rotary Club International, a member of the Huntsville Committee of 100, and serves as Chairman of Launch 2035.

Mr. Marks is married to the former Laurie Quick of Columbus, Georgia. They have two sons, William and Jacob, and reside in Huntsville, Alabama.

National Security Appropriations package passed by Senate, FY20 process complete

Includes Largest Military Pay Increase in a Decade, \$1.375 Billion for Border Wall

WASHINGTON, D.C. – The United States Senate today passed the second of two FY2020 comprehensive appropriations packages, H.R. 1158, by a vote of 81-11. The legislation includes spending measures for the Appropriations Subcommittees on Department of Defense; Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies; Financial Services and General Government; and Homeland Security. Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Richard Shelby (R-Ala.), who also chairs the subcommittee on defense, issued the following statement upon passage of the national security-related funding legislation:

"Finally, we have secured the funds and resources for our military – our national security. This package includes a significant increase in defense funding and the largest pay raise in a decade for our men and women in uniform. Further, Congress has now passed many of the President's important priorities, such as funding to defend our Southern border and the protection of critical transfer authorities that will allow him to devote additional resources to border security and immigration enforcement, as needed. We have worked tirelessly to advance these bills, and I am proud of our end result – the completion of our FY2020 appropriations process. I want to thank my good friend, Vice Chairman Leahy, and also Leaders McConnell and Schumer. Our bipartisan path led to success thanks to the hard work and cooperation of all of our

colleagues. I am proud to say that this legislation is on the way to President Trump's desk."

The package of bills was passed by a vote of 280-138 in the House of Representatives on Tuesday, December 17th and was signed into law by the President on Friday, December 20, 2019.

Impacting North Alabama:

- Army Research \$12.5 billion, an increase of \$1.5 billion from last year, for investments in transformational technologies to address modern and future Army warfighting needs.
- Missile Defense \$10.4 billion for the Missile Defense Agency (MDA), including \$628 million to support urgent MDA unfunded priorities such as space sensors, hypersonic defense, and cybersecurity.
- Hypersonic weapons \$1.9 billion to support and accelerate offensive and defensive hypersonics research and prototyping efforts, an increase of \$362 million from last year. This funding includes \$161 million to address an unfunded priority for the Army Hypersonic Weapons System.
- Cyber \$268 million in additional funding to expand and accelerate cyber research across the Department of Defense, and an additional \$200 million to support the Department's new 5G program.
- Military Space Fully funds National Security Space Launch and Space Command, and includes funding to establish Space Force and Space Development Agency.

William P. Marriott Deputy to the Commanding General U.S. Army Aviation and Missile Command

William Marriott was born into Naval Aviation in Pensacola, Fla., during his father's service as a Navy helicopter instructor pilot. Upon graduation from the Naval Academy in 1979, he enjoyed a 26-year career as a Naval Aviator.

After graduation from the Academy, he attended flight training in Pensacola, Fla., and Corpus Christi, Texas, and was designated a Naval Aviator in November 1980. After training in the P-3 Orion, he joined the Patrol Squadron SIXTEEN (VP-16) "War Eagles" where he became an Instructor Pilot and deployed to Bermuda, the Philippines, Spain and Iceland. His other operational tours include: Aide and Flag Lieutenant to the Commander, Fleet Air Mediterranean/CTF-67 in Naples, Italy, with the Patrol Squadron FIVE "Mad Foxes" as the Maintenance Officer and Senior Instructor Pilot deploying in support of Operation DESERT STORM and also deploying to Rota, Spain, and Keflavik, Iceland; Commanding Officer of Patrol Squadron SIXTEEN where he led them on a multi-site deployment to Puerto Rico, Panama, and Iceland; and Commander of Patrol and Reconnaissance Wing TEN at Whidbey Island, Wash. In April 2001, he led Wing TEN through an international crisis when 24 members of one of his aircrews were detained in China after a mid-air collision with a Chinese fighter aircraft.

Marriott's staff tours include: Safety and Flight Standardization Officer for Patrol Wing ELEVEN; Special Assistant to the Chief of Naval Personnel for Selection Board Matters; Senior Aide-de-Camp to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Gen. John Shalikashvill; Federal Executive Fellow at the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy assigned as Staff Director for a bipartisan commission headed by Dick Cheney and Richard Perle; Armed Forces Staff College in Norfolk, Va.; another tour in the Pentagon as a Congressional Analyst for the Secretary of the Navy in the Office of Program Appraisal; Chief of Naval Operations Fellow in the Strategic Studies Group at Newport, R.I.; another tour in the Pentagon as the Executive Officer to the Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Financial Management and Comptroller); and the Executive Secretary for the Department of Defense in direct support of Secretaries of Defense Donald Rumsfeld and Robert Gates.

Marriott retired from active duty in 2005. He was appointed to the Senior Executive Service In July 2005 and served as the Executive Secretary for DoD until departing for the U.S. Army Materiel Command in 2009. He served as the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel and G-1. He reported to the U.S. Army Aviation and Missile Command as the Deputy to the Commanding General in 2015. He served as the Executive Director of AMCOM from February to June 2019.

His awards include the Presidential Rank Award - Meritorious; Army Decoration for Exceptional Civilian Service; Defense Meritorious Civilian Service Award; Superior Civilian Service Medal; Defense Distinguished Service Medal; Legion of Merit (with one star); Defense Meritorious Service Medal; Navy Meritorious Service Medal (with two stars); Navy Commendation Medal (with four stars); and numerous campaign, operational and honorary ribbons.

Veterans Prayer Breakfast


